

### The seasons, and a Swallow out of place

We live in England, a place famous for its weather, it's changeable and unpredictable. But we know we are moving into spring now as Hazel catkins have been in flower for several weeks and daffodils have been in flower in sheltered corners in the Stowey's for some time. It feels right for the time of year.

We take visual clues from what is around us to know how the seasons are changing. We can look at the calendar and see that we are in March, but as we walk about and see bare trees and leaves on the ground, it feels right for the month that we are in.

So you can imagine our surprise when walking the South West Coast Path along cliffs in Cornwall near Bedruthan Steps, in mid December, when we saw a bird totally at the wrong time of year. The weather wasn't icy cold but it was cool and windy enough to be wearing big coats and wooly hats. All the shrubs and near by trees were with out leaves, and the cold looking sea was crashing onto the rocks on the beach below, when flying low along the path towards us came a Swallow! This was a very bright day and the Swallow, only a few meters away, looked such a bright blue, but so out of place on these winter cliffs. It just felt so wrong! What could it be finding to eat, they only eat insects which they catch whilst they are flying, and it was mid winter, and seemed insect free to us!

I have to admit seeing this Swallow was not a total surprise, as through the birdwatchers grapevine I had heard that two Swallows had been flying around the Sainsbury's car park in Penzance for a couple of weeks, and thought that that did seem a really strange thing. But to actually see what we know as a summer visiting bird in the depths of winter myself was really unsettling. Our winters have been very mild over the last few years, which might well to be due to climate change, but it hardly seems they are mild enough for enough insect food to be on the wing in December. Did these Swallows never leave the UK and go to Africa in the autumn, or did they go some way south across Europe and then turn back? At the moment we just don't know how many Swallows stayed around in Cornwall, or if they can survive with us till spring comes around again.

#### **GARDENING WITH NICK RIGDEN**



#### March 2022

February is now behind us and with the days getting longer March is a busy month in the garden with the soil warming up, spring bulbs in full flush and weeds

starting to grow!

**Ornamentals:** March is a month for 'spring cleaning' the garden and borders can be forked over and plants that were left for winter display such as grasses and sedums with attractive seed heads can be cut down. Overcrowded perennials can be lifted and divided so that the older inner portions are rejected and the vibrant outer sections can be replanted or potted up (perhaps for future plant sales!). Take the opportunity to ensure that there is no perennial weed within the new portions. Once spruced up the borders can be mulched with well rotted compost or farmyard/horse manure. Mushroom compost is fine but beware of mulching around acid loving plants as it usually contains some chalk. By the end of the month (if not already) the soil has received as much winter rain that it can normally hold and a generous 75mm (3") of mulch will not only keep the moisture in the ground for longer but also act as an annual weed suppressant.

It is not too late to plant a choice winter flowering shrub or two which will provide a good display for future winters. Lonicera x purpusii (winter flowering honeysuckle) is excellent as is Sarcococca confusa (the winter box) and Viburnum farreri 'Candidissimum'.

**Pruning:** Dormant season pruning of top and soft fruit should be completed as should bush roses and later flowering shrubs such as Buddleja (the Butterfly bush). This is also the month when the coloured stem dogwoods and willows should be pruned. This will encourage strong new growth which always possesses the best colour and results from cutting back hard to buds near the base of the plant. Follow up by giving the plants a good feed with a general purpose fertiliser such as Growmore or blood, fish and bone and then apply a mulch around the shrub

**Vegetables:** As the soil warms up, particularly if cloches or polythene

have been laid on the surface, it is the month to get some early sowings of vegetables underway. However, if your soil is still damp and sticky it is better to delay until conditions improve. Choose early varieties of crops such as lettuce, rocket, spring onions and later in the month leeks, parsnips, spinach, broad beans and peas. At the end of the month well chitted early varieties of potato such as Casablanca, Rocket and Foremost can be planted. Onion sets, shallots, and autumn sown brassicas (your own young plants or purchased from a garden centre) can now be planted. An alternative is to start the sets off in modules and then plant out with a good root system and about 25-50 mm (1-2") of new foliage.

**Lawns:** This is the month that provided the surface is dry the lawn will benefit from a good rake and brush and then lightly topped with the mower. Redefine lawn edges and reseed thin or bare patches.

#### **Over Stowey Parish Council**

The January meeting started with a positive discussion regarding the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. A group of local residents had met to

establish what type of event might be suitable for the parish and requested that their initial proposals be considered by the Parish Council. The following points were covered:

The event should be a one-day event, likely to take place at the cricket ground (which has adequate parking), with support and input from the Parish Council, the Village Hall and Recreation Ground Committee (VH&RGC), the Cricket Club and the Parochial Church Council

This was agreed by the Parish Council and representatives of the VH&RGC advised that the VH&RGC also support the proposal

Date and times are to be confirmed – the date is a particular priority

Funding opportunities will be explored and it was considered by all that any applications should come from the Parish Council. The

Clerk will help to enable this and will also act as an intermediary between the organisers and the Parish Council

Provision for food, drink and entertainment will be discussed as soon as possible to ensure operators are booked well in advance

The organisers have experience of arranging larger gatherings and will liaise with other groups who may be planning events locally

Further research into beacon lighting and tree planting will also take place

The organisers will meet prior to the February Parish Council meeting and this item will be on the agenda up until the event takes place. Further information will be made available as plans progress. The Parish Council are pleased to be able to support the work that is being undertaken and thank those who are giving their time and energy, making plans to celebrate a very special occasion.

Another positive is that the Aley Phone Box – Book and Plant Swap project is now fully up and running. If you would like to take a small number of books and/or plants to donate, please feel free to do so and in return, enjoy a good read of a new (to you) book whilst your new plants grow!

The highways issues continue and it is hoped that a meeting with all relevant parties will take place in the near future. The Clerk is continuing to press hard for action to be taken sooner rather than later, but there are no guarantees that this will happen. Updates will continue until these issues are resolved.

The councillor vacancy will have been considered at the February meeting and if a candidate is co-opted on to the Parish Council, details will be forthcoming in the next issue of the Messenger.

As the general public are aware of where to go for guidance with regards to COVID-19, this information will no longer be included in the Parish Council update, but of course if anyone does need any help or support from the Parish Council, please do not hesitate to contact the

### Hinkley Point C - Monthly Update



#### A round up of the latest news from Hinkley Point C.

Apprenticeships: Build the future In February Hinkley Point C celebrated National Apprenticeship week with this years theme: 'build the future'. The week celebrated the 874 apprentices that work on the project and took the time to shine a light on the positive impact that apprenticeships have on the project at HPC, to the individuals and to the local economy. Apprentices at HPC shared their experiences of what it is like to be an apprentice, dispelled some 'apprenticeship myths' around



pay, job prospects and the age ranges of those working as apprentices and attended sessions focussed on career development and wellbeing.

Apprentices form a key part of the workforce at HPC supporting construction while developing UK and regional engineering and nuclear expertise. HPC has an ambition to create 1,000 apprenticeships during the construction phase and remains on track to meet this target.



Hinkley vaccine centre opens- Hinkley Point C has become the first construction project in the UK to open its own vaccination centre. Workers are now having their coronavirus jabs on site, by NHS trained nurses. More than 100 vaccines have been given out so far, reducing the pressure on local health services. The clinics are held twice a week in the Hinkley Health Centre, which is staffed by GPs and nurses. The team have been trained in administering doses of the Pfizer vaccine, including the booster jab. The project has now officially joined

the government's vaccine programme, after being given approval by the UK Health Security Agency and the NHS. The vaccine centre is part of a series of covid measures in place at Hinkley Point C, which are designed to protect the workforce and surrounding community. More than 66,500 covid tests have far been carried out at testing hubs across the project. People who access the site are also being asked to either declare their vaccine status or show evidence of a negative lateral flow test.

**Stowey Green Spaces Group** had a most useful month as regular walkers through Stowey Wood will be aware. The trees planted in 2018 had become so smothered by brambles that most of them could not be seen, and clearing this growth had become a major task. The Group holds regular working sessions on the first and third Tuesdays of every month and so met to clear the brambles on the 4<sup>th</sup> of January and 1<sup>st</sup> Febru-

ary, supplemented by Taunton Midweek Volunteers on 20<sup>th</sup> January. However, the greatest impact was made over a special work weekend of January 29<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup> with an unprecedented turnout of 20 people. Many thanks indeed to all those who came and did such magnificent work. It is hoped that by the time this article is available bramble clearing will be more or less completed. It is pleasing to note that most of the planted trees have survived and, as is apparent, some are growing very well. On the intermediate Tuesday in January, Group members worked on the Castle Mount raking bracken that had been sprayed with Asulox, leaving the soil bare to help germination of seeds

and the growth of grass. Early appearances suggest that there could be a good display of violets just inside the gates to the Mount to complement the primroses that grow so prolifically in and around the moat.

St Mary's Church has always held a series of meetings during Lent and the topic this year is Climate Change. The Group's conservation work is partly a response to climate change and to improve biodiversity, as this has suffered, largely unseen, over many years and ultimately this decrease will affect humanity. ### **NEW Village Hall Plans**

The present Nether Stowey Village Hall is 100 years old, built-in 1922, and is showing its age in its centenary year. Repair costs are increasing year on year, but the income generated by the hall decreases year on year. This is an untenable situation as there is a risk that if a new village hall is not built, Nether Stowey could be left without a community centre which is unacceptable in the eyes of the charity.

That is why the Nether Stowey Village Hall and Recreation Ground charity have been working on a project to relocate the village hall to the recreation ground. The project will provide a modern village hall with a kitchen and bar, stage, sizeable multipurpose function room, meeting room and car park. It will also provide changing rooms for recreational activities. With the outside becoming the new indoors throughout the pandemic, the new Village Hall will have a serving hatch and external covered seating area, public toilets as well as large bi-folding doors and windows.



The car park will have allocated electric vehicle charging points, bike storage and safe pedestrian access that will encourage green transportuse. The energy efficient building will be powered by solar panels.

The Thomas Poole Library have kindly agreed to display the plans in the library for the community to view them at their leisure. Smaller versions are displayed in the Portacabin on the recreation ground.

It is hoped that alternative temporary venues for current user groups can be found to ensure a limited impact whilst the new centre is built.

The current Nether Stowey Village Hall will be closing on Thursday 31st March 2022, in readiness for the eventual sale of the land. All proceeds of the sale will be used to build the NEW Village Hall on the recreation ground and act as match funding for other grant providers. Without the money from the sale of the current Village Hall, a new centre will not be built as it accounts for approximately 30 % of the new build cost. The remaining funds to build the new centre will come from community fund raisers and grant providers. Grant providers insist the charity provides match funding. For example, if they gave the project £10k, towards the cost of a new kitchen at £20k, the charity would have to find another £10k to build the kitchen.

**WI** "Where's My Fish'? was the intriguing title for our talk at our 10<sup>th</sup> February, we were all wondering how can anybody talk about fish for 40 minutes? In fact, our WI meeting was treated to a very interesting and very entertaining talk given by Kevin Little, who owned and ran a fishmongers in Reading for 54 years. His company was called The Smelly Alley Fish Company, not a reflection on the fish he sold, but named after a narrow footpath at the junction of three streets that was used as an open sewer in the 16<sup>th</sup> century. Kevin has seen a lot of changes in his long career as a fishmonger, and he regaled us with many anecdotes about all the ups and downs of dealing with all the bureaucracy from various government departments and health inspectors, mostly concerning the food industry, and his often ingenious ways of getting round problems. They had to keep a Fly Log, as you weren't supposed to have more than 5 flies dead or alive in your shop window! Years ago, every high street had a Mac Fisheries which proved to be the family's nemesis, but his father managed to get around their ongoing price war by artificially reducing the price of a product they didn't actually sell (butter), but forced Mac Fisheries to reduce their butter prices – very clever! Kevin often sailed very close to the wind. It was interesting to know how the terms "Holy Mackerel" and "Red Herring" came about and that they definitely have their roots in the fishing industry. Some of his tales concerned lampreys, which you wouldn't want to know about, and a dead dolphin, which you are not allowed to eat, but are inedible anyway. Kevin does several other talks, and we hope that he may revisit us some time.

Our March meeting will be our AGM, but our April 14<sup>th</sup> meeting will be hosting the Air Ambulance, which is very dear to our hearts in Somerset. # The Thomas Poole Library Evening Talk 9<sup>th</sup> February "Coleridge and Thomas Poole – a momentous relationship"

Terence Sackett, local authority on Samuel Taylor Coleridge and Thomas Poole, gave an edifying talk to a sell-out audience on the friendship between Samuel Taylor Coleridge and Thomas Poole.

Although, Poole was denied a formal education by his father, who decreed he was to take over the tannery business, he was a voracious reader, keen to broaden his



knowledge. He established an extensive library in his book room. On the recommendation of Henry Poole of Combwich (Thomas Poole's cousin) Coleridge and Robert Southey visited Thomas Poole in Nether Stowey. Poole invited them in for tea and took Coleridge to visit the tannery. Coleridge was enthralled by all aspects of science and technology. Poole was keen to further their friendship, both men having mutual radical interests in philosophy and politics, supporting workers' rights, the anti-slavery movement and the principles behind the French Revolution.

Coleridge lived in Bristol and was desperate to move out of the City having attracted much hostility due to his anti-slavery talks and writings. He wrote to Poole asking for any available accommodation in Nether Stowey. Poole replied that there was only the semi-derelict Gilbards cottage. Poole was very reluctant that Coleridge move there but Coleridge insisted. Coleridge wanted a pastoral life. He loved the cottage but his wife Sara did not. It was little more than a hovel. However, it backed on to Poole's house and Coleridge was able to go back and forth and make use of Poole's library. Coleridge joined a reading group set up by Poole. They read many erudite publications including Mary Woolstonecroft's "The rights of woman". Poole was a constant friend and supported Coleridge and his family both financially and emotionally. His mother befriended Sara and son Hartley and introduced Sara to the Cruikshanks of Castle Hill House.

Coleridge had met William Wordsworth in 1795 while in Bristol and persuaded him to move to be near him in the Quantocks. William Cowper said that Poole was instrumental in bringing the two great poets of Coleridge and Wordsworth together.

The "Lyrical Ballads" sprang from Quantock life and it is likely that Poole contributed local stories to inspire the poems.

Through Coleridge's friendship with Thomas Poole, and Poole's generosity, relationships flourished between Coleridge and many of the great thinkers of the time. By 1797 he was surrounded by many friends – Thomas Poole, John Thelwall, Humphry Davy, the Wedgwoods, Charles Lamb, William and Dorothy Wordsworth. Poole facilitated these contacts. Poole was devastated when Coleridge left the village and moved to the Lake District. He left the tannery to be managed in his absence and undertook a Grand Tour of Europe. He met Thomas Paine in Paris and also Napoleon. In 1802 Coleridge attended Royal Institution lectures and Poole accompanied him to a Humphry Davy lecture. He met John Rickman who was Secretary to Parliamentary Commissions. Poole agreed to work on collating the Poor Law returns.

Contrary to common misconceptions Samuel Taylor Coleridge was not purely a poet. He also wrote many essays and discourses on metaphysics and science. He was a philosopher, revolutionary in his ideas, who was fortunate to have the support throughout his life of his loyal friends Thomas Poole and Robert Southey.
